GARDEN TOURS AND WALKS

On July 3 we will visit the *Pinetum* at the Gardens and study characteristics of members of the Pine family.

ACTIVITIES

The three meetings of the Friends held since the last Newsletter have all been very well attended and very much appreciated by both contributors and participants.

Early in April Brian Molloy gave an excellent presentation on the history of Riccarton Bush and led those attending on an informative tour of the Bush. As well as an illustrious past, Riccarton Bush has an exciting future with a well thought out management plan in place and the concept of a 'Living Museum' for Riccarton House. Brian's knowledge of the Bush has been carefully built up with the objective of producing a book about this unique and remarkable natural asset. Preparation of this book is well advanced, and it was clear from the response Brian received from his presentation that it will be a book of great interest to the Friends.

The At Home Soup Plus Lunch proved to be a very enjoyable occasion for all those who attended. The idea of a Lucky Number with a plant as a prize worked out very well indeed, and the raffle of plants is proving a good way to raise funds. The Society has been fortunate to have had plants donated for this purpose by the Gardens and the Horticulture Department of Lincoln University. At the lunch, interest in the plants provided for these purposes was very much enhanced by the description of them provided by Roy Edwards. The variety of soups and other foods provided a tasty and ample meal.

It was very encouraging for the Herbarium Keeper, Dr Murray Parsons, and Assistant Herbarium Keeper, Bryony MacMillan, of the DSIR Land Resources, Botany Institute, to have such a large number of the Friends make the trip out to Lincoln. Many of the Friends will now be much better informed about the function of a Herbarium and aware of the important link between the Botany Institute Herbarium and the Botanic Gardens provided by the historically important Armstrong collection. All must agree that this collection is under excellent care along with the other specimens in the important National collection contained in the Herbarium.
