# RECENT EVENTS

On Wednesday 16th March John Thacker gave an interesting talk entitled 'Plants -poisonous, noxious or simply maligned' John supplemented his talk with a short video presentation and poster displays. Plant material brought along to the meeting was discussed and much interest in the topic was generated. Why are some plants noxious? An excerpt from information supplied by John. "Plants that are noxious have been introduced into New Zealand and have adapted to our environment. In the north of the North Island a garden plant becomes 'adventive' about every ninety days. This means that many native plants are being excluded by the spread of these many introduced aggressive plants. Often introduced plants have been impurities in seed lines, while others have been deliberate introductions. Nassella tussock was supposed to have been introduced from the Argentine as fodder for stock. This plant spread rapidly once introduced."

Dennis Preston's talk on Wednesday, April 20th on 'The Christchurch Botanic Gardens 100 years from now' created much interest and discussion. Some of the ideas put forward by members were interesting, while some

others were radical and thought provoking.

Dennis presented a number of potential scenarios and developed his ideas using slides maps and large aerial photographs of the Gardens.

On Saturday 16th April, Members of the Committee of the Friends met Kelvin MacMillan at the Botanic Gardens to discuss issues relating to the Management Policy Document. This walk with Kelvin was a good opportunity to discuss with Kelvin future issues. Both the Committee members that attended and Kelvin agreed that this was a useful exercise.

Ashburton Day trip - organised by Bob Peers. Sunday 27 March 1993 On a very hot late summer day, twenty nine Friends travelled by car to Ashburton. Alan Trotts' garden was our first visit, where we admired the wonderful lawns bordered with deep beds of trees and shrubs. Alan has developed the garden since he began planting in earnest on his 10 acre block in 1984. Plantings include 50 different Magnolias, 1200 Rhodendrons, 350 Camellias, perennial borders, a formal rose bed, and formal plantings of Sorbus aria 'Lutescens'. We look forward to more time to enjoy this lovely garden and time to see the nursery. on another visit. Dulcie Page's garden was a delightful contrast - a small new garden totally full with many treasures and the variety and use of climbers was of great interest. David Askin District Superintendent of Ashburton Parks and Reserves, met us in the Ashburton Gardens, and spent nearly 2 hours with us. A conscious effort has been made to make these gardens user-friendly, and many Service groups contribute to the facilities and development. The tree plantings here are of special significance, and worthy of more detailed study. David has great enthusiasm for his work and is keen to make the Ashburton Gardens better known. Judy Peterick is another very enthusiastic gardener with every space filled, and interesting combination of colours and foliage effects. The fabulous expanse of perfect lawn at Norma and Clarry Galway's garden left us

gasping! The surrounding gardens are recently planted and beautifully maintained

Oaks in the Gardens with Max Visch. Very few members had any idea how many
different oaks we would learn about with Max.
He is preparing a pamphlet on oaks, which
will be another in our series of pamphlets
available at the Info Centre for .50c. (Our
oak count on our recent walk was 18!)

Tree Ferns with Neil O'Brien Neil showed a group of about fifteen or so around tree ferns and ferns within the gardens.

Five tree ferns were looked at in the native area near the Cockayne Garden and in the area in and around the Fernery. Ferns were also discussed. The main tree ferns examined were Dicksonia fibrosa wheki-ponga, Dicksonia squarrosa wheki, Cyathea dealbata ponga or silver fern, Cyathea smithii katote or soft tree fern and Cyathea medullaris mamaku or black tree fern. During the walk the main distinguishing features of each were discussed.

May 18 Meeting with Robert Crowder. Bob as he is perhaps better known is a Senior **Lecturer from the Department of Horticulture** at Lincoln University. Bob spoke enthusiastically to a group of about thirty to forty members including staff from the Botanic Gardens about Organic Husbandry. During his presentation he included attractive samples of fruit and vegetables grown at the Organic Husbandry Unit at Lincoln University. - All without any chemicals at all. In fact the area has been growing fruit and vegetables without chemicals for about eighteen years since Bob Crowder established it. Bob's three main points were 1. Look after the health of the soil. 2. Look after the aerial space by planting flowering plants suitable for predators such as the ichneumonid wasps to feed on, which in turn will take care of many of the garden pests such as aphids etc. and 3. To maintain genetic diversity - in

other words do not rely solely on just a few selected cultivars within a species. In conjunction with the last point however time is needed to sort out plants which are resistant to pests and diseases to reduce the need to use chemicals. During the address Bob illustrated points with slides and afterwards with an interesting question and answer session.

NOTE: Bob Crowder is organising the IFOAM conference to be held at Lincoln University in December 1994. There will be a large contingent of International speakers present as well as local ones.
